A Forever Gift of Land



The Grist Mill Project

A good deal of time and energy was expended on our Grist Mill project in 2015 which culminated in a 4 to 1 vote of approval by the local Planning Board. A few opponents have chosen to appeal the decision. Our goal is to create a small place of beauty and learning in the heart of our community, restoring an iconic piece of our past to the Dock Square area, just as the renovations on Goat Island did to Cape Porpoise. Independent funding will allow us to replicate this 1749 structure in an historic way, using vintage materials. When constructed, it will be the only working tidal grist mill in North America. It will be a wonderful addition both to the Trust in our Children programs and to our town.

At Our Headquarters

Brian Fairfield, Art Vose and Gabe Bernard created a beautiful courtyard at the organization's Emmons Preserve headquarters, which was wonderfully landscaped by Helene Lewand and her crew from Blackrock Farm. A new lawn with proper drainage was created and the area around the nearby pond was cleared, making the property even more attractive. In addition, the whole building was painted, new stairs and a storage room were added and extensive repairs were made to the Emmons house and barn.

With Lisa Linehan overseeing the office, the operations of the Trust remained strong. The budget was met. Trust membership and donations increased. Our popular "Thought & Photo of the Week" and "Looking Back" photo and quote were enjoyed by thousands each week, which included over 1100 household emails as well as our over 1800 followers on Facebook. The Trust headquarters was the scene of much activity, being used for 105 different functions, most of them family related. Thirty-three uses were for other local non-profits who are doing good work for the people of our community. The Trust's policy is to assist such organizations by offering our building and grounds free of charge for their activities.



Events Galore!

The Trust, once again, had a full calendar of enjoyable events throughout the year. It started out with our annual 12th night celebration where the theme was Woodstock. Everyone enjoyed dancing to the music of that era performed by the Guv'nors Band. Our former Phillip H. Matthews Memorial Lobster Bake became the 1st annual Summerfest. Great music featuring the Mallett Brothers Band, delicious food from Mark & Giselle Nedeau of Ned's Bakes, Sea Salt & Smoke, Blended Bliss, Love K cupcakes and Arundel Ice Cream Shop kept everyone happy. So too did our hot air balloon rides courtesy of Re/Max and our first annual human foosball competition. Our thanks go out to Tim Spang of Spang Builders & Hazlewood Handyman, along with Art Vose and Mike Mackiewicz for making that fun idea a reality. This year's event looks to be just as enjoyable. On the first day of spring an event was held at Blackrock Farm where a wide range of information concerning best practices and invasive species removal and replacement was shared. Knowledge taken from there was put into use as students from the University of New England conducted field trips to Vaughn's Island. They identified various plant species and then compared their findings to a similar study done over thirty years ago. They also mapped out invasive plants at the Emmons Preserve and Goose Rocks Beach. Leia Lowery's UNE intern, Dylan Price, was actively involved in mapping and removing many of these plants from the Emmons Preserve, assisted in the process by Mark and Gail Roller

Trust Trail Blazers



With the help of the Kennebunk High School alternative education students, work began on a "story book trail" at the Trust's headquarters. Harbor Headlines

From Jenne James, KCT Harbor Committee Chair

The Harbor Oversight and Management Committee was formed two years ago, with several goals. An overall management plan for the islands and harbor would help with the coordination of various activities like the Island Steward program, children's fieldtrips, island cleanups, monitoring of the local ecology, and planning for the long-term future of the islands. This past year, much progress was made:

- We began an effort to reforest Cape Island, which lost many trees in a microburst several years ago. Great thanks go to Dan Viehmann and his crew who planted hundreds of tree seedlings, donating their time and materials!
- Plans were put in place to do some restoration work of the small building on Stage Island, to provide shelter for anyone caught in bad conditions.
- A program is being developed, with the help of board member Dr. Pam Morgan and her UNE students, to collect environmental data in the harbor, addressing things like the recent algae bloom and the presence of other invasive species.
- Local resident Erin Gott was approved to set up a small aquaculture area by Vaughn's Island to grow oysters, which are known to be excellent water filters.
- Goat Island welcomed an estimated 1,200-1,500 visitors. Keepers Scott & Karen Dombrowski, and Craig Giefer hosted Boy Scouts, biweekly work parties, Discovery Days for kids and for adults; and they participated in Open Lighthouse Day, Flying Santa activities, and more. There was also the need to do some repairs on the ways.

The latest development in Cape Porpoise Harbor is the installation of a new foghorn system by the US Coast Guard, which maintains the light and horn as navigational aids. The new technology is


being used statewide and is not automated to react to fog conditions, but rather must be activated remotely by a boater in need, with a standard VHF radio. The MRASS (Mariner Radio Activated Sound System) is triggered by keying the transmit button five times on Channel 83A. On foggy days, this will be done from the pier by the Harbormaster. Once keyed, the horn will sound for 60 minutes. With these new changes, we want to make sure that everyone on the water is aware of the new system and is up to date with Coast Guard safety requirements and suggestions.

We are also excited to welcome a new Island Steward Program Director! The founder of our steward program, Bob Haskell, has moved on, and we are indebted to him for all his work in creating such a successful model. Luckily for us, steward Mike Mackiewicz stepped forward and is very enthusiastic about his new role! He hit the ground running and is wholeheartedly spreading the good word.



Kennebunkport In National Spotlight

Trust in Education’s evolution into Community Conservation is on the cutting edge of a larger movement throughout the country. Land trusts everywhere are moving toward being stronger partners with their community by addressing the needs and desires of their patrons. While some may argue that working with at risk youth and older populations is “mission creep”, we believe that loving the land and being a part of both the natural landscape and the community itself is what being a good steward is all about. This expansion, including our living history project, and furthering our outreach into our own school system is getting recognition nationally. In fact Land Trust Alliance published a story about the Trust in a recent edition!

About Russ: E Russell Grady, Jr., or as we know him, Russ, is a new member of the Board of Directors. Russ was raised in a small mill town in Central Massachusetts and spent many of his childhood days out of doors exploring a neighboring farm and its forest and pond as well as the Wachusett Reservoir dam which was a short walk down the street.

Russ is a resident of Kennebunkport and with his wife Julie and two sons, Patrick and Christopher, has lived here for nearly 20 years. Russ has worked in the auto insurance industry for nearly 20 years and is responsible for corporate strategy and standards at Liberty Mutual Commercial Insurance. Russ is also a Realtor and Associate Broker with Berkshire Hathaway HomeServices in Kennebunk.

Russ has served on various local committees and boards and is a 15 year volunteer fire fighter with the Kennebunkport Fire Department. When not at work Russ likes to spend his time on the KCT trails and in the White Mountains. As a member of the board, Russ will be focused on our conservation easements and assisting other KCT committees.



About Karl: Karl's family moved to Cape Porpoise from the Lowell, MA area in 1960 when he was 6 years old. He has fond memories of rowing punts in Cape Porpoise harbor, playing on the rope swings, climbing on shorefront rocks or camping on the islands. And he may (or may not) have taken a ride or two in the dumb waiter at Atlantic Hall after Cub Scout meetings. His memories of growing up in the Cape were happy ones. Karl's ties to the community remain strong to this day.

Currently an R&D contractor and technical writer, his prior work focused on new product development, prototyping machines to produce a novel carbon composite for Navy aircraft. He is now working with U Maine's ASCC Lab to develop a production process for a photovoltaic fabric under an Army contract. He has designed and built physics-based exhibits for the Children's Museum of Maine and recently engineered a public art project in Portland. Karl brings a wide range of technical abilities to our board, as well as small business experience. He also maintains our beloved Iris (a vintage 1935 Dodge Brothers pickup) and can always be called upon for technical support.

Karl built his current home on land near the Emmons Preserve and enjoys walking or snowshoeing the Trust trails with his dog Buddy. He serves on the board of a local engineering company, has been a volunteer mediator for the Maine Department of Attorney General, an arbitrator for the Better Business Bureau, and an active volunteer with several organizations serving people with disabilities for over 25 years. He is an adaptive alpine ski instructor for Maine Adaptive Sports and Recreation and helped to build an adaptive waterski program with Northeast Passage at UNH. He also volunteers as a Young Eagles pilot, flying kids in his 1947 Stinson aircraft which he restored 12 years ago. He fitted hand controls to a Cessna 172 at a local flight school so it could be used to train paraplegic pilots. He loves the outdoors, is an avid supporter of the Trust's mission and served on the board of trustees for several years prior to becoming a director.


