

Infrequently Asked Questions:

Q - \$35 is a hardship for me to pay. Can I donate a stone for less or for free?

A - We will accept every stone donated with loving intention to honor someone. We're asking those who *can* to contribute towards the building and maintenance of this community labyrinth.

Q - Will everyone know how much I have donated?

A - No. Donation amounts won't be disclosed other than in KCT records.

Q - Can I donate a stone in honor of my beloved dog?

A - We would prefer stones to honor people. However, we understand that for some, the connection with a dog or other pet can be especially meaningful. We only ask that you let us record the story of why this particular animal was so beloved to you.

Q - Can I donate one stone to represent both my parents?

A - Absolutely. It makes perfect sense to donate one stone to honor 2 or more people who are closely connected - and their connection is what makes this stone meaningful for you.

Q - Can I donate one stone to honor lots of different people?

A - If these different people are connected and it is that connection that makes this stone meaningful for you, then please name the stone in honor of that group. However, if these different people are unconnected, we suggest that you honor them separately with different stones.

Q - Can I donate a stone in honor of a person or people I don't know personally?

A - We would like this labyrinth to be full of stones that honor people who are, or were, loved personally by their donors.

However, if you would like to honor someone you know because of their love and connection to the wider world and community, that would be a wonderful way to broaden the intention that is brought into the labyrinth.

Q - Can I mark the stone with the name / initials of the person I wish to honor?

A - The name of the person honored will be displayed on a plaque near the labyrinth site and recorded for future publication. But the stones that come into the labyrinth with individual intention remain unmarked because they come together to form one path that is universally open and significant. (If symbolism is helpful, we might think of this as representing that while we are each uniquely different, we are essentially all one, like a drop of water is essentially one with the ocean. When the droplet joins the ocean it lets go of its own individual identity...)

Q - I wish to donate a stone but don't want my name published. Is this okay?

A - This is a community labyrinth and the process of collaboration is part of what makes it special. We would therefore *prefer* to be able to share names and stories so that we can build connections within the community. However, we will respect the wishes of donors who want to remain private.
